Minnesota Statutes section 10A.022 and Minnesota Rules Chapter 4525 describe the procedures required for investigating complaints. A full description of the complaint process is available on the Board's website. Briefly, the Board will notify you when it has received your complaint. The Board must send a copy of the complaint to the respondent. Complaints and investigations are confidential. Board members and staff cannot talk about an investigation except as required to carry out the investigation or to take action in the matter. After the Board issues a decision, the record of the investigation is public.

The law requires a complaint to go through two stages before the Board can begin an investigation: a prima facie determination and a probable cause decision. If the complaint does not pass one of the stages, it must be dismissed. The Board chair or their designee has 10 business days after receiving your complaint to determine whether the complaint alleges a prima facie violation. If the complaint alleges a prima facie violation, the Board has 60 days to decide whether probable cause exists to believe a violation that warrants a formal investigation has occurred. Both you and the respondent have the right to be heard on the issue of probable cause before the Board makes this decision. The Board will notify you if the complaint moves to the probable cause stage.

If the Board determines that probable cause does not exist, the Board will dismiss the complaint. If the Board determines that probable cause exists, the Board may start an investigation. In some cases the Board will issue findings, conclusions, and an order as its decision. In other cases the Board will instead enter into a conciliation agreement with the respondent. The Board's final decision will be posted on the Board's website.

Minnesota Statutes Section 10A.03, Subdivision 1, requires a lobbyist to file a registration form with the Board within five days of becoming a lobbyist or being engaged by an individual or entity for lobbying activities.

I believe the research documented below establishes that Jennifer DeJournett has been lobbying for Clean Water Actions since 2023. Despite this activity, I have verified that no registration form has been filed by Jennifer DeJournett as required under Section 10A.03.

During the 93rd Minnesota Legislature, DeJournett lobbied the Minnesota Legislature to pass legislation regulating products containing intentionally added perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS).

- DeJournett's public LinkedIn page details her lobbying work, which she describes as "Legislative Coalition Building."

Consulted for an environmental advocacy group to engage a diverse group of legislators, non-profit organization leaders, and business representatives to develop and pass legislation limiting nonessential uses of the chemical class knowns as PFAS (forever chemical) in consumer products in Minnesota. Attended multiple meetings at the State Capitol and assisted in securing bipartisan support to pass the legislation."

- DeJournett testified on March 6, 2023, in the Commerce Finance and Policy Committee of the Minnesota House of Representatives. Link

- DeJournett <u>attended a press conference</u> about the legislation she was lobbying for on May 9, 2023.

After extensive lobbying, the Minnesota Legislature passed the legislation advocated by DeJournett. In detailed media reports later in 2023, the full extent of DeJournett's lobbying work became known.

- DeJournett said she "was able to [the legislation] through...because [she] had the relationships..."

DeJournett's lobbying work with two registered lobbyists to pass PFAS legislation in Minnesota was featured on an episode of Clean Water Action's podcast, We All Live Downstream, which was released on July 19, 2023.

### DeJournett was described as "working tirelessly..." to "...pass one of the strongest laws."

o "I'm your host, Jenny Vickers Chyb, the National Communications Manager at Clean Water Action. Today, we have an amazing podcast for you. We're going to be chatting with three incredible women who not only stood up against industry and billions of dollars but challenged the status quo in politics, working tirelessly across party lines, refusing to play partisan games, and pass one of the strongest laws in the world to protect people from PFAS, forever chemicals in Minnesota.

## • A lobbyist for Clean Water Action said DeJournett was needed to "get Republican support" for legislation.

o "Um, and I knew that we were going to need bipartisan support. We only had one, um, DFL vote, um, as a majority in the Senate.

And so I called Jennifer, um, who she always introduces me as her lefty bestie. And I said, there's absolutely no way. That I can do this without Republican support. And I will never get Republican support if I don't have you. So, um, let's do a crazy thing together" Avonna Starck, Vickers Chyb, J. (Host). (2023, July 19). And so we worked really, really closely. Thanks to Jennifer, um, who introduced us to one of the medical device lobbyists, we were able to have really the prosthetic that she needed. Good conversations. We, we met in a neutral location. We had coffee. We ended up exchanging phone numbers and texting and again, really bonded over the fact that we were all moms and, um, we're able to create language that was reasonable yet effective and protected the community." ## • DeJournett discussed her participation in lobbying meetings with legislators.

o "For me, um, I, so it just came off a statewide campaign, um, where it would have, was the closest, uh, almost statewide victory for Republicans in 20 years. And one of the things that kept hitting across that campaign was, Um, the false notion that Republicans don't care about environmental issues, and, and that is completely not true, actually.

And I, when Ivana called and asked, um, if I would help out on this issue, I was like, of course I can, because it makes sense. And, um, of course we don't want to pollute our water. And of course we need to have responsible environmental policy in the context of, um, operations and business. And that's good.

It's good for everyone. And, um, of course, we don't want to pollute things. And then it's actually more expensive to clean it up than to do the right thing the first time. And I knew that there is bipartisan support for environmental issues and at least coming to the table. And I think that's what's gone wrong in, in the political space or the public policy space today.

Everyone's gotten to the point where we have to vilify the person on the other side, even if we have an honest disagreement or. And so it makes it harder to collaborate on things where we do have agreement and have those reasonable, thoughtful conversations and say, okay, we agree on the problem. We may have different solutions to the problem, but at least can we talk about it and work through those and come to something where we can agree and work together on?

I think that's better. Um, not only for democracy as a whole, but I mean, especially in the environmental space, you don't want everybody on one side or the opposite side of the issue because then you don't have a negotiating partner on the other side. And when we have these meetings, um. And I, Ivana was, would bring me to hers and I would bring her to mine and we would sit down and talk to people in a thoughtful way, they would say, you know what, we, we actually do agree. Now, we may not like this whole omnibus bill, but if this was a standalone, yes, we could support this. And then you saw that. Inaction when it didn't get loaded up with ridiculous amendments that were poison pills or, or reindeer games, as I like to call them on the house floor where people are just making people take ugly, stupid votes or making the ridiculous speech just to vilify the other side.

That's such an important topic. Silence sometimes is is also very telling in the political space to say, okay. All right, we agree with you. We're not going to slug this out or muddy this up because it's the right thing, especially when when they're getting pressured as well to do those ridiculous things by the other side to create the legislative record on the issue. So, so, I guess that's the thing that kind of kept me going is to say, you know, we can work together and we can have those good conversations if we all trust each other enough to have. - Lobbyist for Minnesota Center for Environmental Advocacy detailed working with DeJournett on messaging, on committee testimony, and on social media advocacy.
  - o "And it really was a full team effort. Our field and phone cameras showed up. Um, we hand delivered The notes that field collected to lawmakers, thanking them for their support. We also, uh, testified very strategically, uh, with the way that Andrea and Jennifer and I crafted our messages to each of the committees.

A really good example of that. That was Jennifer had a ton of connections on the Commerce Committee. So she testified and really crafted her, her testimony in a way that her friends and allies on that committee would understand. Um, we would joke that I, I speak DFL speak and she speaks Republican speak.

And so we were really careful with how we packaged them. Um, all of our town halls were partnered with MCA. So while we were reaching out to our members, Andrea was reaching out to her. Members and we use social media really, really heavily. And Jennifer's absolutely right. When there was a situation where somebody either said something that wasn't factually accurate or threatened to say something that was factually not accurate, we would get on Twitter and we would get on Facebook.

And we, um, in a very positive way, share the school truth and the actual facts and not what the way that industry was trying to present it. - Lobbyist for Clean Water Action wrote her partnership with DeJournett, "...allowing historic environmental legislation to pass."
  - "Because of the trust Starck and Dejournett shared, they were able to lend credibility to each other and the legislation, opening doors normally closed to them, and allowing historic environmental legislation to pass." DeJournett was elected to the Three Rivers Park District in 2012, serving as commissioner and filing Statements of Economic Interest with Hennepin County.

DeJournett did not list any compensation from a lobbyist, lobbyist principal, or interested person for services as an independent contractor or consultant on her Statement of Economic Interest filed in 2023. She was obligated to disclose if she **received \$250 in compensation** "for consulting or independent contractor services provided to a lobbyist, lobbyist principal, or interested person."

I have attached a copy of Ms. DeJournett's resume. She describes her work in 2023 for an environmental advocacy group, stating that she:

"Consulted for an environmental advocacy group to engage a diverse group of legislators, non-profit organization leaders, and business representatives to develop and pass legislation limiting non-essential uses of the chemical class known as PFAS (forever chemicals) in consumer products in Minnesota." "Attended multiple meetings at the State Capitol and assisted in securing bipartisan support to pass the legislation."

These activities fall under the statutory definition of lobbying in Minnesota (Minn. Stat. § 10A.01, Subd. 21), particularly "attempts to influence legislative action by communicating with or urging others to communicate with public officials." Without being registered as a lobbyist, this would be a direct violation if compensation or reimbursement were received for such activity.

On March 4, 2025, Avonna Starck, the Minnesota State Director of Clean Water Action Minnesota, testified in the Environment and Natural Resources Finance and Policy Committee of the Minnesota House of Representatives.

Chair and members of the committee. My name is Avonna Stark, state Director of Clean Water Action. Again, thank you for your time. In 2023, we pulled together stakeholders to ensure the threat of PFAS was understood and that bill care was carefully designed. It passed with bipartisan support, thanks to the help of Jen DeJournett, who's now the executive director of the GOP. And I don't think you get more bipartisan than that. One concession given was adding the phrase intentionally added. In other words, we aren't asking for reporting on anything that isn't intentionally added and put there for a reason. If a manufacturer is producing something and they don't know what's in it, that is deeply.

Starck publicly credits DeJournett with helping pass PFAS legislation, a clear indication of substantive involvement in shaping, advancing, or advocating for the legislation.

It passed with bipartisan support, thanks to the help of Jen DeJournett, who's now the executive director of the GOP. And I don't think you get more bipartisan than that.

The phrase "thanks to the help of Jen DeJournett" directly associates her with influencing the legislative outcome.

This testimony, paired with DeJournett's resume, presents compelling evidence of unregistered lobbying activity. If she was compensated for this PFAS work, as her resume suggests, and engaged in advocacy at the State Capitol, her failure to register as a lobbyist may constitute a violation of Minnesota's lobbying disclosure laws.
